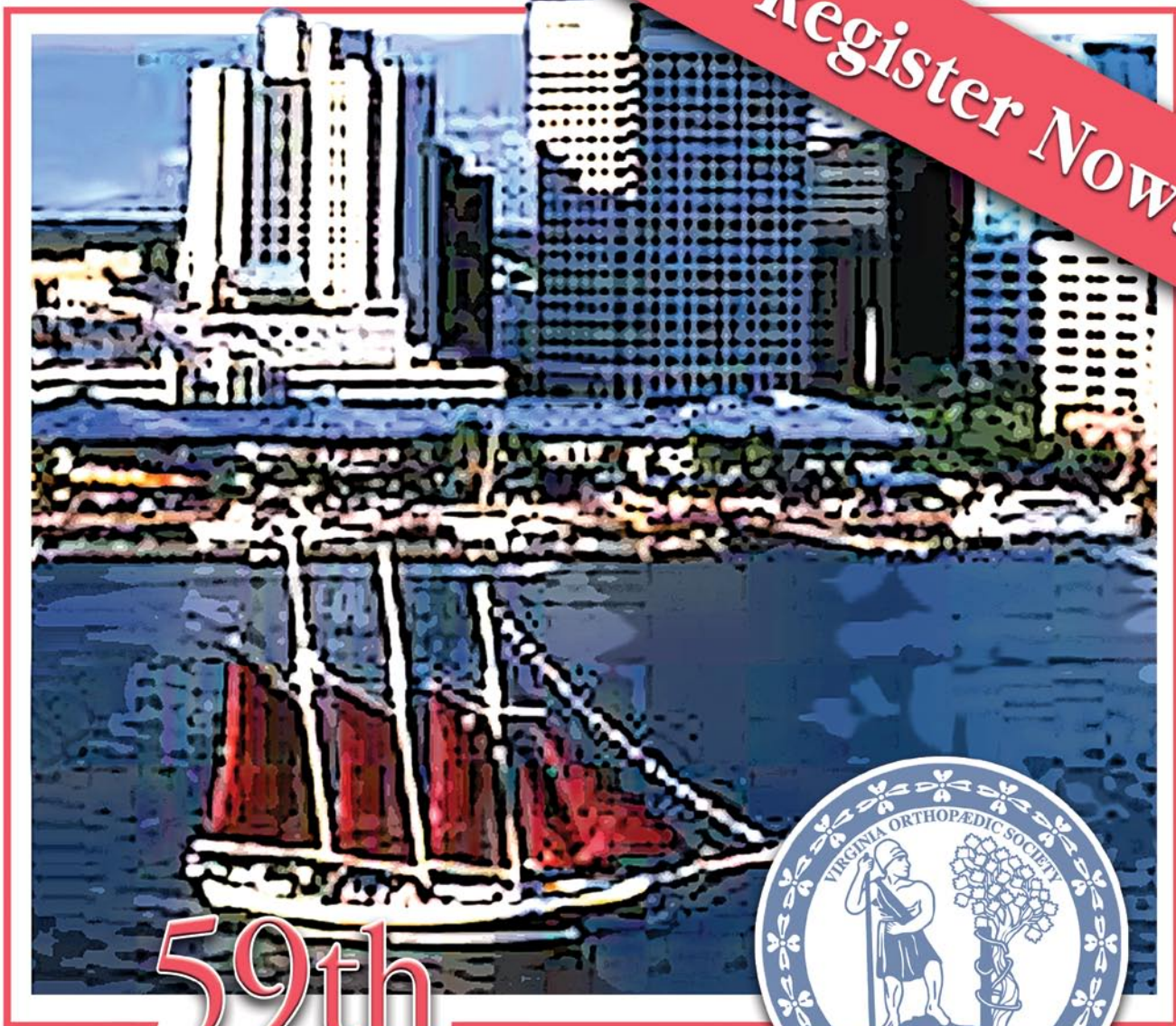

Program Objectives

Participants in this educational activity should be able to discuss and evaluate current research in Orthopaedics being done throughout Virginia. Participants will gain new understanding and be able to discuss the evolving roles of orthobiologics in orthopaedic practice today and possible future utilization to include:

1. Bone graft substitutes: utilization in fracture treatment including nonunions and in bone void filling including structural defects in total joint replacement surgery
2. Cartilage regeneration
3. Bioabsorbable implants

Participants will also receive the latest updates on the status of new orthopaedic technologies and should be able to describe surgical navigation systems in total joint replacement and orthopaedic trauma surgery.

This meeting will also provide participants with a review of important areas of clinical interest and research taking place at Orthopaedic residency training programs throughout the Commonwealth.

Friday Dinner Invited Speaker

Terry L. Whipple, MD

Dr. Whipple is Director of Orthopaedics and Fitness at American Self. He is an internationally renowned and widely published orthopaedic surgeon who has practiced in Richmond since 1979.

Dr. Whipple attended Princeton University where he majored in International Law and Organizations and graduated with honors. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Virginia.

He did two years of residency in general surgery at Baylor University Medical Center, served in the U.S. Navy as a general medical officer, then performed his residency in orthopaedic surgery at Duke University.

Dr. Whipple has been a member of the Board of Editors of six professional journals, and has edited and authored four orthopaedic textbooks. He is a member of 25 professional organizations and holds 13 patents on surgical instruments and implants.

Guest Speaker

Jay Lieberman, MD

*Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery
UCLA Medical Center
Los Angeles, CA*

Dr. Lieberman has established a national and regional reputation for his expertise related to primary and revision total joint replacement surgery and treatment of osteonecrosis of the hip and knee. He is also interested in developing minimally invasive techniques to enhance surgical outcomes. Dr. Lieberman is a member of the Hip Society and the Association of Arthritic Hip and Knee Surgeons. His research interests include the use of bone morphogenetic proteins to enhance bone repair, gene therapy and outcomes after total joint replacement procedures. He has published more than 80 articles and book chapters. He has been awarded a Physician Scientist Award from the National Institutes of Health and the American Orthopaedic Association ABC Traveling Fellowship.
